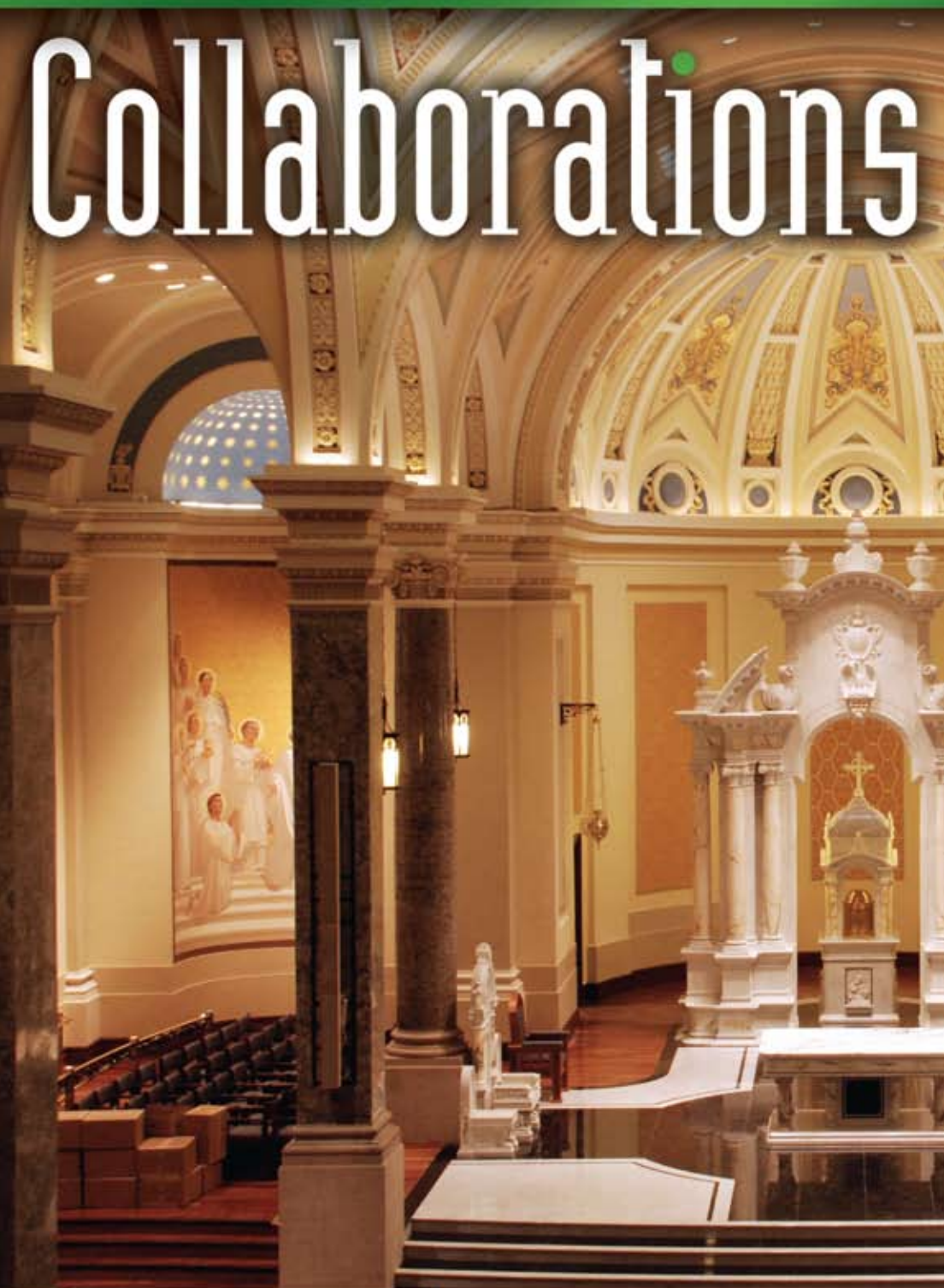

CONVERTING A COMMUNITY CENTER TO A RECREATION CENTER.

Remodeling a 52,000-square-foot building under the watchful eye of 18,000+ people each month should be a daunting task. For Simpson Construction Services, it's just another day on the job at the Derby Recreation Center.

Originally built in 1986 with an addition in 1994, the facility needed heavy updating to truly convert it from a community center to a recreation center. Offices and meeting rooms for large events are no longer a priority. While the rooms are still used on weekends for special events, the facility's emphasis has shifted to daily use activities.

With help from the architect, the Derby Recreation Commission decided to repurpose existing space instead of adding to the facility. "We listened to what the community was saying and that prompted the changes we are making," says Trina Bauer, assistant superintendent for Derby Recreation Commission.

The fitness area size is doubling to accommodate the growing member base. In addition, three program studios are being built to allow simultaneous use for adult fitness classes, youth dance classes and yoga. Major facelifts in the locker rooms, offices, indoor pool, nursery and façade complete the renovation.

The daily challenge of keeping members safe is priority. Simpson has created a phased approach which temporarily closes one area for remodeling, while keeping others open so activities can proceed as scheduled.

Constant communication, redirected activities and temporary entry points has kept the job on track. Bauer compliments Simpson's project management for making an easy transition, "I can't tell you enough about how Simpson has worked with us on this. We've had lots of communication and everyone on site is available when we need them or have questions."

"I haven't heard one negative about the construction," Bauer says. "The Derby community embraces the recreation center and wants to see the changes we are making"

Prairie Gynecology promotes well-being by discovering the root cause of disease and healing instead of just relieving symptoms. One way to promote well-being is to create a chemical-free environment. Simpson Construction renovated a 3,000-square-foot space to create a spa-like, organic medical facility by working with non-standard materials and detailed, high-end finishes. Methodical process and thorough, continuous conversation ultimately benefitted the owner and the entire partnership.

Every detail in the medical office was carefully considered. The patient lounge area is a calming environment with natural stone backsplashes, walnut and maple hardwood millwork and beams,

Cambria Quartz countertops and a barreled ceiling. The lounge also features uncommon finishes including a curved wall with ceramic tile wainscot and radius millwork following the contour of the circular sink. In the lobby, custom glass partition doors and glass shelving provide privacy with a crisp, contemporary finish.

Schematic drawings were presented in early January 2012 and the contractor provided budget options based on those drawings. The project began in February with demolition and, just 10 weeks later was handed over to the client - on time and on budget. Simpson Construction Services successfully created a restful, beautiful and healing environment, while meeting all the traditional medical practice standards.

Contemporary retirement facilities incorporate a safe, homelike environment with progressive care options. This was the goal of Via Christi Villages in Hays when they contracted with Simpson Construction Services. High priority was placed

on creating a first-class facility where Via Christi Villages' staff can provide the best possible care.

Amenities abound at this 82,000-square-foot skilled care and assisted living facility. Residents can make a date with family or friends at the on-site soda parlor or saloon. They can also visit the beauty parlor, participate in physical therapy, or worship, without ever leaving the grounds.

Residents' rooms are set up in pods of six neighborhoods, each offering 16 private and semi-private rooms for a total of 96 beds. Private rooms open to each neighborhood's shared living quarters, central bathing facility, kitchen and dining area, as well as a den and enclosed patio area.
